Regardless of whether you ever stand in front of teenagers to "teach", you are influential in the communication process

Being a good communicator to teenagers isn't the same as being a good youth worker

God doesn't need flawless communicators... just faithful, hardworking ones

"If you think the gathering of biblical facts and standing up with a Bible in your hand will automatically equip you to communicate well, you are deeply mistaken. It will not. You must work at being interesting. Boredom is a gross violation, being dull is a grave offense, and irrelevance is a disgrace to the Gospel. An environment of grace, encouragement, and cheerleading should surround those who communicate

You're always communicating, even when you're not speaking

- Ethos: "Can I trust you?"
- Pathos: "Do you care about me?"
- Logos: "Do you know what you're talking about?"

Reflection questions:
